THE MTA DOESN'T CARE IF YOU DIE.

OK, a slight exaggeration. But the fact is they want trains to keep up a breakneck pace, **even if it in means dead passengers**. The Transport Workers Union has launched a campaign to prevent avoidable tragedies in our subways — tragedies like the two recent pushing incidents, and the horrifying New Year's Day suicide of a young woman.

Riders who fall, jump or get pushed onto the tracks die on the average of one each week (54 dead in 2012). Double that number are hit, but don't die. These deaths could be reduced RIGHT NOW. All it would take would be for trains to slow down a bit coming into stations. Then "too late" becomes "just in time."
